Special Agent Arnold Laanui is a graduate of Damien High School and Pepperdine University. He holds the unique distinction of being the first student from Hawai'i to participate in the FBI's Honors Program. After earning a law degree (Juris Doctorate) from the University of Hawai'i, Special Agent Laanui entered service with the FBI in 1995.

Special Agent Laanui's investigative career began in the FBI's Violent Crime/Major Offender Program where he served for eight years as a member of the FBI's SWAT Team. He led complex investigations across a variety of criminal violations to include bank robbery, juvenile prostitution, serial homicide, police corruption, narcotics trafficking, labor racketeering, computer hacking and child pornography.

Special Agent Laanui is a vocal advocate of digital ethics who has instructed tens of thousands throughout the United States and has made numerous print, radio and television appearances. He is an acknowledged contributor in several books to include the decisive textbook for certified network penetration, *Hands-On Ethical Hacking and Network Defense* (Simpson, Michael T., 2006, 2010). A past recipient of Hawaii's Top Cop Award, he has received numerous honors for his authorship of education and crime prevention programs for youth and teens.



Special Agent Laanui currently serves the FBI as a program coordinator, advanced instructor and as adjunct faculty of the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia.
