



**Dr. Maenette Benham**, a Kamehameha Schools graduate, began her education career teaching K/1 in the Bay Area, California, followed by teaching grades 3/4 and 7-12 in Texas and Hawai'i schools (also teaching at Kamehameha Kapālama). During her 15-year preK-12 career, she had the opportunity to serve as a K-12 curriculum specialist, elementary school administrator, and regional-level administrator. She joined the College of Education faculty at Michigan State University in January of 1993, where she built a strong base of inquiry that centered on educational leadership, indigenous education policy, and research and evaluation methods. She is the lead author of numerous articles on these topics, and has published several books to include: *Culture and Educational Policy in Hawai'i: The Silencing of Native Voices*. Dr. Benham returned to Hawai'i in 2008 to be the inaugural Dean of Hawai'inuiākea School of Hawaiian Knowledge at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. In January of 2016, she joined the University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu, becoming the first Native Hawaiian woman chancellor in the UH System. Her passion and commitment to healthy, vibrant and sustainable learning environments for Kanaka Maoli and all people of Hawai'i and Oceania is grounded on the motto she has lived her life by, "Kūlia i ka nu 'u!"
