‘O nā mahina ‘o ‘Aukake me Kepakemapa ka wā a ka ‘oama e hiki mai ai ma nā kahakai o Hawai‘i nei. He i‘a li‘ili‘i ka ‘oama. Ua like paha kona loa me ka lō‘ihī o ka manamana lima. ‘Oi aku ka nui o kekahi o lākou ma mua o kēlā, akā me kēlā nō ke ‘ano o ka hapanui.

A he i‘a ‘ono maoli ‘o ia no ka ‘ai ‘ana. He palai ‘ia i loko o ka ‘aila. A ‘ai ‘ia me ka laiki wela a i ‘ole me ka poi paha. Hiki nō ke ‘ai ‘ia kona kino holo‘oko‘a mai ke po‘o a hiki i ka hi‘u a me nā iwi pū nō.

I ka hiki ‘ana mai o ka ‘oama, he hiki nui mai. A he hiki pū mai me ka lehulehu puni kāmākoi i‘a o Hawai‘i nei. E ‘ike ‘ia nā kānaka e kū pa‘apū ana i loko o ka wai i hiki aku i ke kuli. E pa‘a ana kēlā mea kēia mea i ka ‘ohe ma kona lima. A e nānea ana lākou i ka huki i ka i‘a i luna. Ua loa‘a nā lāhui like ‘ole. A he hele nō ho‘i nā makahiki a pau mai ka ‘elemakule a hiki i ke keiki li‘ili‘i e komo kaiapa ana.

‘O ka manawa kai piha ka manawa e ‘ike nui ‘ia ai ka ‘oama ma ka pili kai. He mana‘o ko kēia pipili ‘ana mai i uka. I ka pi‘i ‘ana mai o ke kai piha, he pi‘i pū mai me ka hohonu o ka wai o ka laupapa. A hiki ho‘i i ke kākū, ka pāpio, a me nā i‘a nui ‘ē a‘e ke komo mai ma luna o ka laupapa a ki‘i mai i ka ‘oama. ‘O ia ke



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kumu o ka ‘oama e pipili mai ai i uka. ‘Oi aku ka pāpa‘u ma laila. ‘A‘ohe ona makemake e ‘ai ‘ia nō ho‘i!

Inā ‘oe e nānā ma lalo o ke po‘o o ka ‘oama, e ‘ike ‘oe i ‘elua ‘umi‘umi. Ho‘okahi ‘umi‘umi o kēlā ‘ao‘ao kēia ‘ao‘ao. Me kēia mau ‘umi‘umi ‘o i a e hāhā ai i ke one no kāna mea‘ai; he ‘ōpae paha a i ‘ole he pāpa‘i li‘ili‘i paha.

Ma kona ‘umi‘umi a me ke ‘ano o kona kino, ua maopopo, he weke li‘ili‘i ka ‘oama. I kona wā li‘ili‘i, ua kapa ‘ia ‘o ia he ‘oama. Akā i ka hala ‘ana o ‘ehā paha mahina, ua lilo ‘o ia i i‘a nui a kapa ‘ia kona inoa, he weke. A na kēlā weke, me kona mau hoa pū, e ho‘opiha hou i ke kai i ka ‘oama hou i ka makahiki e hō‘ea mai ana.
