COURSE OVERVIEW

'Āina can be a teacher, a classroom, a lesson, a food source, and a way to self-determination. This course will provide a general introduction to mālama 'āina practices via both traditional and technical sustainability practices. Through this rich context, haumāna will gain hands-on experiences that foster a sense of kuleana to their homeland, Ka Pae 'Āina o Hawai'i.
