KA NĪNAU NUI: ESSENTIAL QUESTION NO HEA MAI 'OE? WHERE DO YOU COME FROM

The nīnau nui, or essential question, for this semester course is this: *No hea mai 'oe? Where do you come from?*

This particular unit, Moʻokūʻauhau, will encourage haumāna to dig deeper and gain a better understanding of their own ʻohana & origins. Haumāna will be introduced to a variety of resources in order to aid in their research.

The project is comprised of 2 parts: a Puke 'Ohana and a Mele Ko'ihonua. The rubric for both portions can be found in the following pages.

NĀ LĀ NUI • IMPORTANT DATES

- Nowemapa 18 & 19: Unit introduction. Start Mele Koʻihonua.
- Nowemapa 21 & 22: Archivist from UH Mānoa guest presentation on genealogy research resources (during class)
- Nowemapa 25 & 26: Mele Koʻihonua 1st Draft due
- Kēkēmapa 2 & 3: Mele Koʻihonua 2nd Draft (individual meetings)
- Kēkēmapa 10 & 11: Final version of Mele Koʻihonua will be performed in class. Final written copy is due at time of performance. Puke 'Ohana also due at this time.

HE MELE KO'IHONUA • A GENEALOGY CHANT

Haumāna will choose one side of their 'ohana to research & create a Mele
Ko'ihonua, or genealogy chant. The chant will be completely ma ka 'olelo
Hawai'i & we will go thru the editing process in class. The mele will be
memorized & performed in class during finals week for a final grade.

NĀ KOINA • THE REQUIREMENTS

- KA 'OHANA: Mele ko'ihonua must trace back at least 4 generations (back to haumāna's great-great gradparents). Any additional lines in the mele that are memorized & performed during the mele will be counted as extra credit.
- NĀ LAINA: Mele koʻihonua must be a minimum of 20 lines. For additional lines, haumāna may include additional details about 'ohana, 'āina ties, or any other information they find important.
- **KA HO'OPA'ANA'AU: Mele ko'ihonua must be memorized** for final performance during the week of finals.

KA PUKE 'OHANA • FAMILY BOOKLET

Haumāna will choose one side of their 'ohana to research & compile a Puke 'Ohana, or Family Booklet. The puke 'ohana will be comprised various including but not limited to: 'ohana tree chart, 'ohana interviews, legal documents, and pictures. The puke 'ohana will be compiled & submitted in class during finals week for a final grade.

NĀ KOINA • THE REQUIREMENTS

- **KA MO'OKŪ'AUHAU (5 'AI):** Family tree chart. May be hand drawn or digitally created.
- NĀ NĪNAUELE (10 'AI): Family interview. May be video or audio recorded, but must include a transcription (written documentation). A minimum of 1 family interviews must be completed.
- NĀ PALAPALA 'OHANA (30 'AI): Official or unofficial documents of family members. Puke 'Ohana should contain a **minimum of 10 documents** (may be related to any family member, but not more than 3 per member. Documents cannot pertain to self). For complete list of ideas, see blogsite.

May include but not limited to:

- Birth, Death, Marriage Certificates
- Citizenship Records (Immigration, Naturalization, Passport)
- Land Ownership (Deeds, Grants, Mortgages, Tax Papers, etc.)
- Religious Documents (Baptismal Record, Confirmation, etc.)
- School Records (Transcripts, Degrees, Diplomas, Awards)
- Military Service Records
- Census Records
- NĀ KI'I (5 'AI): Pictures of family members. Pictures can be copies (not originals) and should be labeled with family members names. A minimum of 5 photos must be included in the puke 'ohana.
