The insect, **a cockroach**, is crawling across the kitchen table.

The insect, **a large cockroach**, is crawling across the kitchen table.

The insect, a large cockroach with hairy legs, is crawling across the kitchen table.

The insect, a large, hairy-legged cockroach that has spied my bowl of oatmeal, is crawling across the kitchen table
