

Papa Ehā Huaka'i 2018-2019

Our huaka'i will focus on the theme of Alaka'i Lawelawe or Servant Leadership. Our goal is develop a foundational understanding of alaka'i lawelawe in our haumāna through three components: **Pilina** (What is our passion, purpose, drive?), **Kuleana** (How do we take action?), and **Lawena** (What daily behaviors/ actions show alaka'i lawelawe?). With our overarching theme question (**What does it mean to be a servant leader?**) in mind, Papa 'ehā will travel and learn from different places and people in our community to connect historical servant leadership and wahi pana (special places) with themselves and today.

Chaperone Kuleana

Here are some guidelines to facilitate clear communication and expectations on our Papa 'Ehā huaka'i.

- Not all huaka'i require chaperones.
- All 'ohana members volunteering or chaperoning on a huaka'i **MUST** be verified and cleared by school administration. Please be sure proper paperwork and meetings have been completed.
- **TRANSPORTATION**- For most huaka'i, parents may choose to ride the bus or meet the group at our huaka'i location.
- **FOOD**-Parents will bring their own lunch and drink and may not share with their child. All students will have their own school sack lunch. We want to prevent unfair sharing.
- **ATTIRE**- Appropriate and comfortable attire and footwear.
- **LAWENA**- Papa 'Ehā Kumu are in charge of the entire group. All decisions about group activities and changes will be made by the Kumu. If questions, comments, or concerns arise, please speak with the Kumu.
